## A Brief Word from the General Director

CJM will soon be celebrating 75 years since organizing into a full-fledged missions outreach organization. Four years prior to that, God placed His hands on Margaret Ridgway (27 years of age) to follow the bewildered Japanese families into the dismal ghost-towns of interior BC. The evacuation of all citizens and non-citizens of Japanese extraction were mandated to be removed by government edict from the west coast of BC. Margaret soon became friends to many evacuees both young and old alike. Happy Hour Bible Clubs were formed amongst the children, youth activities and ladies craft clubs all became an attractive involvement for many. The years following became exceptional times of evangelism and spiritual awakening in the life of many Japanese youth and adults. Missionaries were employed as Japanese began to scatter throughout the provinces and country. Many Isseis too, were touched by the Gospel and needs for pastors to minister in the Japanese language also became necessary. Churches were organized in various cities as the Japanese began to settle across the country.

Today, we no longer employ missionaries as we did in the past. With a shared vision of evangelism and outreach with the local Japanese churches, CJM enjoys the cooperation in spirit of unity with all it's affiliated churches across the country. Each year, as the annual CJM AGM/Conf. takes place, which generally is hosted by churches in the four cities of Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton and Toronto, it is heartening to see pastors/leaders of small fellowships make their way to enjoy the ministry and fellowship with their peers. It has been helpful, especially to many pastors/leaders of small affiliated church and fellowships as CJM has been able to offer 50% round trip subsidy for travel for pastors/leader and their spouse. It is through your prayers and financial support that we are able to do this at this time. May I encourage your faithful and generous donations to CJM in order that we can continue to support the overall Japanese evangelical ministry in Canada. □

Calgary Japanese Gospel Church celebrated its 52nd years anniversary on August 31, 2019. Our church was officially established and registered as a charitable organization by Rev. Robert and Chieko Akutagawa in 1967.

Prior to the days the church was organized in Calgary, CJM missionary work was conducted largely in the Lethbridge and surrounding sugar beet farm areas. These pioneers workers did a lot of visitation to Japanese homes on the farms and villages surrounding the city of Lethbridge. When the occasional youth rallies were held, 60-80 Japanese youth would come together for socializing as well as to hear the Gospel message. Numbers of Japanese were saved in those days and many went to Bible colleges and became pastors, missionaries and church leaders. By the mid 1950's many Japanese families had left the farms and moved to eastern Canada or found jobs in larger cities such as Calgary and Edmonton.

Under the faithful ministry of Rev. & Mrs. Robert Akutagawa who had moved to Calgary from Lethbridge in 1961, the Japanese-speaking congregation gradually grew. CJM transferred Nori & Blanche Kanashiro to Calgary from Kamloops, BC in 1968 to give leadership to the growing children's work and to develop the English ministry with Jim & Noreen Kitagawa and Gordon & Lillian Kogawa. As the church continued to grow, several pastors and leaders, each by God's grace, contributed to where the church is now. A building was purchased in 1986 but has now practically outgrown its size.

Today, we have received this inheritance from the pioneers which we must pass on to the next generation. Whoever believes in Christ, who gave His life on the Cross as an atoning sacrifice for our sins, will receive salvation and have eternal life. We have indeed been blessed! We praised the Lord who was and is and is to come. □

On May 24<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup>, 2019, VJGC hosted the CJM AGM/Conf. We praise the Lord for the opportunity, once again. Every 4 years, the event returns to Vancouver. This year we had delegates from Toronto, Montreal, Winnipeg,

Edmonton, Calgary, Banff, and Victoria, each representing their church which is in affiliation with CJM. We all serve in our respective churches, in cities which are miles apart in our huge country of Canada, so it is a great blessing once a year to come together as one family serving in a common purpose of reaching our Japanese community for Christ.

I am glad to see each year, a little by little, we have increased the number of churches participating in CJM meetings. However, my concern is that when I view the overall picture of all Japanese churches, I note that many are in difficulty due to lack of evangelism and ministries of outreach. When I came to VJGC as a pastor in 2001, there were 12 Japanese speaking congregations in Vancouver, but now that number is down to 8 and some of them are stagnant with no growth in numbers. This situation is no different in other cities in Canada where Japanese church were once thriving. The same can be said in America too and other countries where diaspora ministries are seeking to reach the Japanese for Christ. Apart from the lack of spiritual ministry of the Gospel, other reasons may be; the decreasing numbers of Japanese people working overseas, aging members of the churches, some have moved out for one reason or another and difficulties in passing on the faith to the next generation. Some Christians too, have returned to Japan. At this time, there are less than 20 Japanese churches in Canada and some of them do not have a pastor and their numbers are declining. We need to be praying that these trends do not continue.

God has built and established His church in each area according to His will, and though the visible church may close, the invisible church is never closed in heaven. While God gives us the opportunity, He expects us to carry out his Great Commission through local visible churches.

I would like us to continue to pray and think about how we can carry out his mission and cooperate together as a family of God. □

I hope you like it." Until then we had been using a pulpit from

The pulpit was handmade by him. It goes without saying that we are grateful for the use of it. We are learning a lot through the attitude of Trinity Baptist Church willingly opening the door to those in need and welcoming them with love. □

**W**e, at Wesley Chapel Japanese FMC, have been focused on themes of healing and transformation during the past year, reflecting on questions such as, “What does it mean to be a follower of Christ?” “What kind of life is God calling us to live?” “Are we being transformed?” “Are we growing, why not?” We are not alone in this journey of growth, as Christians everywhere wrestle with these questions too.

Peter Scazzero is the author of the book “The Emotionally Healthy Spirituality,” where he addresses the topic of spiritual growth. He explains that one of the reasons we don’t grow spiritually is because we are not emotionally healthy. In other words, it is impossible to be spiritually mature while remaining emotionally immature. Sensing an invitation from God to go deeper with Him, we started a sermon series based on this book in the spring.

We trust God to lead us through this time and bring about the healing and growth we long for. After all, transforming people is something only God can do. We know change takes time, but we feel encouraged as we are noticing the evidence of God’s Presence in our midst: people are enjoying each other during coffee time, people are sharing about their desire to know Jesus’ voice and praying that the Word will find a home in their hearts and change them.”

The blessings don’t end there... we have a baptism service later this year, the bonds of friendship with our brothers and sisters who returned to Japan remain strong despite the distance that separates us, and we have been richly blessed by inspiring guest speakers this past year, who have both affirmed and encouraged us.

We pray that we will become a church that remains in Jesus and loves Him deeply with all our heart and strength. To seeks emotional health, supports and forgives one another, loves neighbours as ourselves and to witness Jesus in word and deed, being doers of the Word and not hearers only. □
